



- All Staff present at meeting except for Historian Michael Higgs who was absent. There is a vacancy 4th JVC position.
- The PDC's that was present: Richard Bamberger, Raymond Chatary, Gerard F. Devlin, , Ernest Law, Charles Myers, Glynn Parker, Michael Sater, Howard Simons, and Robert Wilcoxen.
- Chapters 1, 4, 5, 7, 13, 16, 18, 21, 22, 26, 30, 33, 34, and 36, were present. Chapters 3, 9, 12, 14, 15, 17, and 28 were absent Adjutant announced to the Commander we have a quorum.
- Commander asked all PDC to stand and be recognized.

- All DEC Members present were installed for year 2012-2013

Reading of Last DEC Minutes from 3rd DEC (2011-2012) dated April 14, 2012

There was a motion made by PDC Ray Chatary, Chapter #7 to accept minutes as written, it was 2nd by PDC Howard Simons, Commander Wilcoxen asked if there were any discussion, hearing none, the motion was passed by the body.

Commander Wilcoxen mentioned that the following reports must be accepted individually.

Treasurer Report:

Comrade Billie L. Miles

Treasurer Billie Miles motioned that his report be accepted, it was 2nd by PDC Ray Chatary Commander asked if there was any discussion. PDC Howard Simons comment out of curosity regarding Civic and Charity (6030) expense listed as \$9,200.00, Billie explained that went to

several places, the majority went out to 6th district at the National Convention. Commander Wilcoxen said it is a required money for whatever district is the NEC to take care of their money, in this case the 6th district which is Maryland term as NEC we had that money and it had to be cared for. Howard understood this explanation. Howard stated as next question under Contingency (7060) \$14,799.00, Billie stated we bought a van (Commanders van), we paid for it under budgeted funds. PDC Simons mentioned that the Finance Committee can make a line item for that and they have the power to approve that Line Item for budgeting rather than using contingency line item. Commander asked if there were any other questions or further discussion, hearing none the Report was passed by the body.

Finance Commission Report:

PDC Ray Chatary, Chairman

PDC Ray Chatary, Chairman of DFC, motioned to accept his report as written, PDC Gerard Devlin 2nd motion; Commander asked for discussion. PDC Chatary mentioned that the 2nd paragraph it mentions that line 3900 regarding the 6th District the District, what happened the Districts are not allowed to have a checking account. At the National Convention, the 6th District passed a motion that the money will be handled by the NEC (Glynn E. Parker) from the State Territory. Are there any questions on that?

PDC Chatary then mentioned a letter received from National regarding our budgeted funds? National wants that the MSF and Dept. moneys are combined that sets everything out of kilter. The MSF and Department are 2 separate entities. There was a meeting held between Department, DFC and MSF, a committee was formed to come up with a plan and present it at convention, hopefully in January we can make an interim report. What we plan to do is ask the Department to do a resolution to note that the foundation is not included in that 3 times rule, they are a separate corporations, and we file 2 separate tax reports. National has them together which puts us over that rule. Are there any questions on that? PDC Simons made a comment about talking to the auditor about needing an income line restricted and an outgoing line restricted. PDC Chatary asked on 3900, Howard said yes. The DFC report was accepted by the Body.

Commander Wilcoxen stated that the remainders of reports need not to be accepted individually. He read down report numbers, there were comments on Reports # 16 #34, #36 and #43.

PDC Howard Simons motioned that all reports be accepted unless they have comments or questions, Dept. Adjutant Joseph Cuocci 2nd Motion, Commander asked if there were any discussion hearing none, the motion was carried by body.

Report # 16 Citation and Awards Report - Comment by Commander Wilcoxen.

He commented that at the Convention the Forget-Me-Not Awards were not handed out because some way or another they were neglected. So I would like to take this moment now to hand out those awards.

1001 Members and over – went to Chapter 17 for year 2011-2012

501 to 1000 Members – went to Chapter 7 for year 2011-2012.

251 to 500 Members - went to Chapter 26 for year 2011-2012

001 up to 250 Members - went to Chapter 28 for year 2011-2012 - they are not here at this meeting

Report #34 - Legislative Report - Comment by PDC Gerard Devlin

There was a couple of things I would like to report. When the Prince Georges Gambling Bill was passed, veterans working with veterans we were able to add an amendment on the house floor allowing slot machines to be placed on posts of Veteran Organizations, especially Chapter 7 the only chapter home we have. PDC Ray Chatary has been talking with Lottery Commission and the post is allowed to have 5 slot machines. He and the State Lottery Commission are working out the details, so I can make a report at next DEC meeting. Also the Legislature passed a bill submitted by Delegate Emmitt Burns, Baltimore and Delegate Geraldine Valentino-Smith in Price Georges County a task force looking to setting up a special veteran's court; that is a court dealing with unusual problems that veterans face may come up, this has worked very well in Buffalo, NY. He mention Secretary Chow said he was sending in his name as a potential Member. He said he will report that back to you next year. It has not been a great year for veterans but hopefully it will get better.01:00:42

Report #36 - National Guard Report - Comment by Lamarr Couser

My report tells you how the Maryland National Guard members make their transition to civilian life, it actually has links for videos that you can use to find jobs. The Maryland National Guard civilian employment assistance is trying to use technology to help veterans to get jobs.

Report #43 - Transportation Report - Comment by Tommie Hawkins

Unfinished Business - There was none.

New Business

Howard Simons stated the need for nominations to the MSF. Commander stated the we need nominations today from this Body to be passed on the MSF, we have a need to replace (2) on the board, one is deceased (Mr. Crofoot) and the other is himself because you can't serve in both places, so he asked for nominations from the floor. Chaplain Alfreda Alexander asked to explain what the MSF does. Commander turned over the question to PDC Howard Simons, President of Maryland Service Foundation. He gave a detailed explanation of what the MSF is and does, and what is expected of its members.

Commander opened the floor for nominations.

PDC Richard Bamberger, chapter 36 nominated Ms. Joan Sabree, she is Commander from chapter 36. Also nominated from the Department Staff were Mr. Lamarr Couser, chapter 18 and Mr. LaVaugh Price, chapter 34. Howard requested a letter from the Department be sent to him and he stated that since there are (3) nominees and only 2 positions to fill, he asked of all nominees to send him a 1 or 2 paragraph summary of their interest in the foundation and how their abilities would be best appreciated. He asked if they could do this ASAP because November the 4th we will be voting on this we will have some knowledge of each individual. Commander asked each nominee to do as requested by PDC Simons. Charles Linton, chapter 1 asked a question are they accepted and placed automatically, or do they have to accept their nominations. So Commander asked each one individually, if they would accept this nomination, all three accepted their nomination to the MSF. PDC Simons stated that elected members of the (DFC) Department Finance Committee cannot server as elected members on the (MSF) Maryland Service Foundation.

PDC Glynn E. Parker motioned that the DEC presents a resolution to the National Headquarters that would separate the Maryland Service Foundation from the Department. PDC Simons stated that this needs to be done. Commander Wilcoxen stated we have a motion on the floor. PDC Simons 2nd motion, motion was approved by the Body. Commander Wilcoxen said this will be carried forward; we will make up a resolution to be taken to National.

Good of the Order

John Markowski, chapter 30 – He mentioned that we have a fund Raiser for Perry Point VAMC, we have a lot of P38 (military can opener) for sale here to benefit Perry Point VAMC.

Commander brought up the 6th District Meeting (which Maryland is a member of) is scheduled November 30 till December 2, 2012 at the Holiday Inn, Tanglewood Roanoke, VA. Online there is information for the Hotel Reservation and pre-registration for the 6th District Executive Committee Meeting. The fee is \$12.00 if you register early, late registration is \$15.00. The price for the Banquet is \$36.00. Commander asked if the NEC (PDC Glynn E. Parker) would like to add anything. PDC Parker said he hope to have a large attendance from Maryland. He knows he will have them from Virginia and District of Columbia. He said they hold 4 meeting a year. The first thing they hope to do this year is to decide what States get what committees at the National Convention. Each committee has a State Delegate or Alternation which the State will nominate. That is the most important thing that we will do at that meeting. We want to have a meeting where you will learn something. We want to have some training, and we want to have a women's committee there to support the women veterans. He stated that he has some forms for the 6^{th} District here and would like everyone to take one to bring back to your chapters. He thanked everyone who support him as NEC 6^{th} District. He said since he has been the NEC, He has learned a lot and wants to share that information with you

Commander stated that wherever he has been this year throughout Maryland and at National, the Maryland DAV has been well represented. They have been selected on various committees and served them well. For the Good of the Order, Maryland DAV is active and respected throughout National and the State. Other States are drawing on things that the State of Maryland has instituted such as the vehicle donation program.

Department Adjutant Joseph Cuocci mentioned that the War Memorial Building will be closed for Columbus Day, so the DAV, Dept. Office will be closed, but you can call and leave messages on the phones of Admin, Commander Adjutant or Assistant Adjutant and we will get back with you ASAP.

PDC Gerard Devlin said he has season tickets this afternoon for the University of Maryland and Lake Forest game. Tony Begenwald and I are going but 3 people had to back out, so if anyone wants to go see me at end of meeting. It starts at 3:30PM.

PDC Sater mentioned upcoming 6th District Meeting, that you need to make your reservations because Hotels are filling up fast. He also mentioned the vehicle donation program which has brought in a lot of money for the DAV, Department of MD, but your help is needed also, and preservation of the War Memorial Building and other veteran's monuments and cemeteries across the state. He said the War Memorial is not protected from abuse by homeless people, vandalism & theft after hours, etc. The building is owned by the City and State. Any repairs have been done by the Veteran Organizations in the Building (DAV, VFW and A.L.) or the State, the City doesn't do anything but staff Commissions Office to take care of building during working hours and bring in other Maintenance personnel when needed. He mentioned this year that the DAV paid good money to clean the 2 horse monuments in front of building. It has been noted that others in the city have been given keys to the building so it can be use after hours, the homeless and others can come in and hide till the building is closed. There are various groups that use the War Memorial Building, so it is not protected. City and the Policy have been notified of break-in cases and artifacts stolen. Commander said the city has money allotted to fence in building but they don't have the permits to do it, and if it is not done they will lose the money allotted for it. It was mentioned by PDC Howard Simons to go to city council meeting and express concern. Adjutant Cuocci said to contact news people and get a crew to film and place on TV, maybe then something will be done. Adjutant and Assist Adjutant have approached the city commission and State regarding this matter.

Commander turned DEC meeting over to SVC Lamarr Couser – He asked everyone to rise and give a moment of silence for the POW's and MIA's.

This policy applies only to the six (6) awards authorized by Department By-Laws.

Should an individual of either category attain the required goal the committee may allow an award for each for Current membership year.

Department of Maryland Legislative Award

This award is provided in recognition of outstanding service. Consideration is given to the nominee who was involved in veterans' legislation during current membership year, at either Local, State or National levels.

Department of Maryland Service Award

This award is provided in recognition of outstanding service. Consideration is given to the nominee who, during current membership year, provided unselfish service to Chapter, Department, or National in serving the veteran community and promoting the day.

Department of Maryland Transportation Community Award

This award is provided in recognition of distinguish service. Consideration is to be given to the nominee who, during current membership year, unselfishly aided veterans and their families in their community, providing transportation to veterans, and especially those handicapped or disabled.

Department of Maryland Community Activity Award

This award is provided in recognition of distinguished service. Consideration is to be given to the nominee who, during current membership year, was involved in community activities for veterans and their families. (DAV Auxiliary ("DAVA") unit members are also eligible to receive this award.)

Department of Maryland Membership Award

This award is provided to the Top membership recruiter in the DAV Department of Maryland. For the purposes of this award only, the current membership year begins July 1 and ends April 30. Recruitment data and figures used to determine the winner will be taken solely from the official DAV Membership Department recruiting report. To be eligible for this award, and individual must recruit a minimum of ten new members.

Revised April 6, 2008

Department of Maryland Patriotic and Americanism Award

This award is provided in recognition of outstanding service. Consideration is to be given to the nominee who, during current membership year, was involved in Americanism activities, patriotic programs, Loyalty Day projects and organizing and participating in Memorial Day Activities.

Additional Guidelines And Requirements:

- 1. A Nominee is defined as a member of the DAV or DAVA as defined in Article 11, Section 11.1 of the National Constitution and By-Laws.
- 2. Members of chapters or units in good standing may recommend a nominee.
- 3. Incumbent DAV and DAVA Commanders and members of the Citations and Awards committee are not eligible for the above stated awards.

<u>Optional</u>

Census

The highest census for CHVH, 422, residents, occurred in October 2012. Overall this year the total census numbers were slightly lower. The female population, veterans and spouses, increased this year from a January census of 29 (including 14 spouses) to 40, (including 20 spouses). The female census, overall, increased by 38%.

Staff Development

The staff development team has made rigorous strides in bringing required staff development training into compliance with regulations during 2012. Examples include dementia training, nursing skills fairs, and renewals of mandatory annual training topics.

Behavioral Health Initiative

A behavioral health committee consisting of a full spectrum of staff members was formed in 2012 to look at ways to prepare for the anticipated behavioral challenges of our future residents from the Korean, Vietnam, and Middle East eras as well as how to prepare for the increasing prevalence of dementia in our older resident population. The most common theme arising from these meetings is the need for purposeful education and training of personnel and effective mentoring to actually apply the new knowledge gained in the clinical setting.

<u>Dept of MD American Legion, Sons of the American Legion (SOAL) & American Legion</u> <u>Auxiliaries Bus Donation</u>

On Sunday, July 22, 2012 Past SOLA Commander Buddy Mastin presented a new 2012 Ford Starcraft 18 passenger transport bus to CHVH. The American Legion Riders provided a motorcycle escort from the Waldorf post to CHVH where 250 people had gathered for the ceremony. Commander Mastin raised over \$90,000 to support this bus project.

Emergency Generator Grant Funding

March 5^{th} VA Secretary Shinseki approved the grant application request for the expansion/replacement of the emergency generators. The grant amount awarded is \$3,765,184, which equals 65% of the total project cost. Expected completion March 2013.

Tri-County Veterans Advisory Committee

Director Mattia continues to attend meetings every other month. The Committee is very interested in the CBOC and veterans issues and services in the Southern Maryland area.

Annual Volunteer Appreciation

The Annual Volunteer Appreciation Banquet was held on April 18th. About 120 people attended. Secretary Chow served as Guest Speaker for the event. Individuals and groups were recognized during the program. This year CHVH has been blessed with over 11,500 hours of volunteer services.

Culture Change

Cultural Change is a long term care initiative that will deinstitutionalize long term care. The effort is to enhance facility conditions and projects so that residents feel more at home. Upgrades continue with C1 and C2 painting as the most recent areas being addressed. Also this year we were able to install a kitchen in the A.L. Activities office that regularly serves prepared snacks. Plans are to install a similar kitchen in the skilled nursing activities area.

CHVH Annual Open House

Open House was held on Nov. 3. This year's attendance exceeded 110 visitors. Most visitors did request tours and the Admissions department received numerous inquiries.

CHVH Veterans Day Celebrations

This was the third year that CHVH residents participated in the Veterans Day Parade in Leonardtown, MD. Secretary Chow spoke and presented the Governor's Proclamation. In addition, special remembrances and a celebration meal were conducted at the facility.

Legislative Committee Report 2nd Quarter DEC January 19, 2013

Subject: Legislative Report to the Department Executive Committee (DEC)

The Maryland General Assembly is Maryland's legislative body and directly represents the electorate. The state has 47 districts represented by 47 senators and 141 Delegates. The General Assembly reconvened on Wednesday January 9, 2013 at 12:00 p.m. in regular session. The Legislature meets for 90 calendar days each year beginning the second Wednesday in January to act on more than 2500 pieces of legislation and the State's annual capital and operating budgets. As Chairman of the Legislative Committee we monitor legislation on veterans' issues.

Veterans must influence veterans' legislation by testifying on veteran's bills and legislation and attend hearings in mass to show that we are serious about veterans' legislation. Bills drafted to support veterans are published by the Maryland General Assembly's Department of Legislative Service. The Maryland Department of Veterans Affairs track veterans' legislation (bills) and forwards the bills to the DAV Department of Maryland. After they receive the bills the Department sends them to the chapters electronically. Once the chapters access them we recommend that the members utilize the internet to obtain hearing schedules; the hearing schedules are also posted in Annapolis outside the hearing areas.

It is always gratifying to see large numbers of veteran in attendance in Annapolis to show support for veterans' bills. Readers of this report may help the process by encouraging veterans to come to Annapolis to meet with their elected representative Senators and Delegates to gain their support for veterans' legislation.

It would be great to see a full house at the National Mid-winter Conference at the Crystal City Gateway Marriott, 1700 Jefferson Davis Highway, Arlington, VA on February 24-27, 2013. Among a number of important workshops the Legislative Workshop will be take place on February 25th during which veterans' legislation taken up by the US Congress will be discussed. Attendees will also have the opportunity to travel to Capitol Hill on Tuesday February 26th to visit with their Senators and Representatives or Staffers and to witness DAV National Commander Polzin testify before the Senate and House Armed Forces Committees.

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National Guard Report 2nd Quarter DEC January 19, 2013

During the recovery from the record-breaking storm, we also deployed 71 Soldiers from the 115th Military Police Battalion, demonstrating how we can respond to both our federal and state mission simultaneously. They join more than 300 Soldiers and Airmen currently deployed defending our freedom.

More than 800 members of the Maryland National Guard and Defense Force responded to 41 separate missions in sup- port of MEMA and local first responders. Civilian employees of the Department ensured that we had the resources to respond as needed. Our aviators flew damage assessment flights coordinated by MEMA for the Governor. The Maryland Emergency Management Agency effectively coordinated a statewide response while actually taking the lead in the response efforts in Garrett County.

As Marylanders were recovering from the effects of the storm, New York requested assistance from neigh- boring states. On Saturday, Nov. 3, a Maryland Air National Guard C-27J cargo aircraft crew flew power generators and other equipment to help the New Yorkers recover.
